Procedure	Upon entering, ask participants to sit in groups by subject area and grade level.
	2. Library of Congress main page along with the link will be displayed.
	3. Allow time for attendees to explore the site and introduce themselves.
	4. Direct attendees to the Library of Congress (loc.gov).
	5. Go to the "For Teachers" section and then click on "Primary Source sets." "Primary
	Source Sets" are topical collections of primary sources frequently taught topics across
	all grade levels.
	6. Have attendees review the topics for about 10 minutes.
	7. Have them open a new browser tab for the NYS Social Studies Framework.
	8. Ask each group to identify topics from the Framework applicable to their grade level
	and then collaborate to identify Primary Source Sets that may be useful.
	9. Allow for about 45 minutes of group work and collaboration
	10. Afterward, have attendees share the applicable resources with the whole group.
	11. Allow for questions.
	12. Reflect on the content of the day and establish a goal for the upcoming months –
	How will you incorporate what you just learned? What is your implementation timeline?
	What is your implementation timeline? How also can you use the Primary Source Sets for education?
	 How else can you use the Primary Source Sets for education? What other areas of the site (besides the Primary Source Sets) might you use?
