The Power of Primary Sources:

The power that these items bring to learning is that they are historical artifacts that were created during the time period under study. Primary sources are the raw materials of history and culture. "As such, they capture students' attention," said Potter. "They give students a powerful sense of history and of the complexity of the past in a way that textbooks and other secondary sources don't. Analyzing primary sources prompts students to ask questions; guides them toward higher-order thinking, better critical-thinking and analysis skills; and encourages additional research." (Lee Ann Potter, Dir. LOC Director of Ed. Outreach)

- diaries and journals

- podcasts
- interviews

Secondary Sources:

A secondary source interprets and analyzes primary sources. These sources are one or more steps removed from the event.

Secondary sources may have pictures, quotes or graphics of primary sources in them.



Examples of Secondary Sources

- textbooks
- magazine articles
- criticisms
- commentaries
- encyclopedias
- journal/magazine article which interprets or reviews previous findings
- non-fiction books about events in history, people, etc.
