





	<p>Title: Fashion plates of women wearing hats decorated with bird feathers, 1904. Catlow, Patty Munroe, 1900-1991, collector. Created/Published 1904. Notes Collected by Patty Munroe Catlow as a child. She was the daughter of photographer Ralph Munroe, and lived in Coconut Grove (Miami, Fla.).
