


Book Backdrops: Connecting Literature and Primary Sources

In this book the poem is placed in a more modern setting of a little boy who becomes distracted at a lecture he is attending with his parents and wonders off to wonder at the night sky. Poems about the wonders of nature helped soothe a nation after the Civil War.
